CIRCULAR LETTER TO ALL BRITISH COLUMBIA LAND SURVEYORS

Re: Survey Restoration Program

A submission to the Government will be made by this office in the near future requesting the establishment of fund of money sufficient to carry out an ongoing meaningful restoration program of the basic survey structure of the Province.

To properly detail this need in the submission it is necessary that as much input as possible is received from all sectors of the communities that are, or will be, adversely affected by this lack of basic survey evidence.

Because Land Surveyors are the most knowledgeable of this problem it is necessary that you submit to this office at your earliest convenience details of those areas that require restoration surveys. Your submission should outline the general areas of concern along with any specifically known sections or district lots in the area, the type of country, whether it is basically farming, residential, logging or mining etc., and if there is a current development interest in the area.

If this proposed submission is successful, the survey work, in accordance with Government policy, will be for the most part carried out by private Surveyors under contract from this office.

Your urgent co-operation in this matter is respectfully requested.

Bearing Trees

Section 81 of the regulations has not been amended to include aluminum tags. Those surveyors presently using these tags on Bearing Trees must refrain from doing so.

Heavy Black Line

In the future, plans which have the heavy black line straddling the perimeter boundary line will be returned to the Surveyor for re-drafting of this heavy black line in accordance with the current regulations.
